What is the achievement gap?

- The achievement gap refers to disparities in education in regards to race, gender, and socioeconomic status.
- Students in affluent communities have better test scores, lower drop out rates, and higher college acceptance rates than students in lowincome communities.

The Statistics...

- Students with free reduced lunch are on average two years behind those who don't qualify for free reduce lunch.
- Barely half of African-American and Latino students graduate from high school, with African American students graduating at 54%, Latinos at 56%, and their white counterparts at 77%.

Continued....

- Only 10% of students at Tier 1 colleges (146 most selective) come from the bottom half of the income distribution.
- In our neighborhood of East LA, only 35% of residents have a high school degree.
- Additionally, only 3.7% of residents 25 years and older have a four-year degree
